Aims, Purpose, Objectives & Activities

The general functions of the PCC are stated within section 2 of the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) measure 1956.

St John the Evangelist Church PCC has the responsibility of cooperating with the incumbent, in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. The PCC is also responsible for the maintenance of St John's Church building and the Sir Ken Dodd Happiness Hall.

When planning our objectives for the year the PCC gave consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at our church and to become part of our parish community at St John's Knotty Ash. The PCC maintains an overview of worship throughout the parish and makes suggestions on how our services can involve the many groups that live within our parish. Our services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament.

When planning our activities for the year, we have considered the Commission's guidance on public benefit. In particular we try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish community through

- Worship and prayer: learning about the Gospel and developing their knowledge and trust in Jesus.
- Provision of pastoral care for those living in the Parish.

To facilitate this work, it is important that we maintain the fabric of the Church of St John's Knotty Ash and the Happiness Hall.

PCC (Trustees) Annual Report 2023

2023 began a year of mixed blessings for St Johns church.

January- Rev. Tom Langdon Smith continued to lead the church in weekly worship, whilst also offering Knotty Ash school collective worship sessions together with the West Derby Deanery assemblies' team, alongside beginning to develop a relationship with Clifford Holroyd school.

The remaining sessions of "Cultivate" the Deanery Fit for Mission course took place in the early part of the year, concluding in St Johns in March. A" Family church" was introduced by Rev. Langdon Smith, taking place at 9am on a Sunday morning finishing prior to the main service.

May- As part of the Fit for Mission process a Diocesan FFM coach, conducted a Pyramid review with the PCC, to help identify what was needed to move forward with mission and outreach for the church.

July- A small grant from "Together Liverpool feast of fun" enabled the church to reach out to the community and provide a food and play session for families, while the Praise & Play group offered weekly free play sessions for families which was well received.

August-The PCC began to consider issues appertaining to FFM. Meetings were held to look at what this might mean for the church moving forward. This proved to be a difficult period for the PCC, and much time, prayer and thought went into this.

September saw the PCC agree to completely withdraw from the FFM process. The Diocese were informed of the decision and consequently Rev Langdon Smith resigned as incumbent.

However, September also did see Celebration as Phil Wells was licensed as a reader to St Johns. "Family church" concluded and families were integrated back into the main worship, which was very well received by the congregation who had missed them. The number of families attending continued to grow, with many Baptisms taking place.

October- In order to facilitate worship a Ministry team was formed, consisting of six church members, who together with visiting retired clergy planned and led worship throughout the remainder of the year.

November onwards, a variety of services were offered which included Stir up Sunday, café church, an all-age nativity, Carols by Candlelight with the Red Rose Band and a Christingle service. Throughout the year a wide variety of social events which included Open Mic nights, a visit from the Liverpool Phoenix Choir, who, accompanied by the Red Rose Band, gave us a wonderful evening of Christmas music, family film sessions and a New Year's Eve party have all taken place in church and in the Sir Ken Dodd Happiness Hall. Hall users have continued to grow in number.

Although the latter part of 2023 proved challenging for the church, the end of the year saw real blessing, as church members worked together to keep St Johns a healthy, mission focussed viable church. Moving forward we should look to the words of Jeremiah 29:11 For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future". As a church family we each have our own part to play by letting our "Light shine "and helping our church not only to grow but become a vital part of the local community.

Churchwarden's, Maintenance and Fabric and Safeguarding Report

This year has been an eventful year in the life of St. John's and it's fair to say we have had some challenges but with a lot of prayer and support from each other we are moving forward with God. The PCC (Parochial Church Council) met once a month to discuss church issues and two PCC members also attended monthly Deanery Synod meetings in order to feed back to us issues happening in our deanery.

Just like in a family, our church has to deal with everyday issues – finance, housekeeping, caring for each other, planning ahead and we are grateful for all those who volunteer their time and energy to maintain the smooth running of St. John's.

Maintenance

The Quinquennial inspection (a church building inspection that must be carried out every five years) was done in September by our architect, Robin Wolley. His conclusions were that our church is in a generally fair condition and well maintained, although the report identified some urgent work on the fabric of the church. There were eight recommendations in total including

- · Replacing the flat roof to the vestry
- Clearing leaves and debris from the gutters
- Overhauling and painting rainwater goods
- Cutting back trees and vegetation affecting the Lych Gate
- General examination of all roofs.

We have been able to carry out some of these tasks ourselves but are in the process of accessing grants to help with some of the work. The Quinquennial inspection was followed up in December with a meeting with Tom Beesley, the Diocesan Building Advisor, where we planned the way forward.

Regular checks were also carried out on church amenities including the boiler, clock and lightening conductor There were some problems with the sound system so plans are in place to improve it. The organ was tuned twice during the year and we are grateful to Brian Jones who continues to look after it.

Safeguarding

Safeguarding and safer recruiting has taken up a lot of time. The PCC has complied with their duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 and all PCC members and group leaders hold a current DBS certificate and have attended safeguarding training to Basic Level. All volunteers are safely recruited by completing a Safeguarding form. Safeguarding is a mandatory item on every PCC agenda as it is important that we look after each other as a family.

Many thanks to you, the congregation, for your generosity, support, prayers, love and friendship in all we do to grow our church family and in the wider community. Whilst

we still have our challenges, it's wonderful how we are pulling together across the parish. Through all this we have demonstrated God's love for one another and that we can spread His message whatever challenges we face.

Deanery Synod Report 2023/2

During this period, your representatives Sue Mitchell & Alan Malthouse attended meetings on behalf of St Johns Knotty Ash P.C.C. The main discussion point throughout all meetings was "Fit for Mission" and the newly branded "Christ our Hope" diocese and the Deanery plan to place before the Church Commissioners for the Finances to move forward. Most of the congregation will know that we as a church opted out of F.F.M last year and consequently therefore we no longer have a Team Vicar.

Another discussion point was Patronage a long-standing C of E protocol, as our patron is St Marys West Derby and whoever the incumbent is at the time (currently the Rector Rev Stephen Boyd). A proposal was put to synod to vote for an alternative patronage board which would exclude the Rector of West Derby and just the Bishop of Liverpool and the Team Rector making all consequent decisions on appointments of Vicars within our Diocese. The vote was in favour of the proposal however St Johns voted against as did several other churches and the Rev Boyd will be writing to the Church Commissioners outlining his objections.

The West Derby Synod do not currently have a Lay Chair from the elected members and the Area Dean has been chairing meetings.

Reports From Groups

Bible Book Club

BBC continues to run on a Monday evening in church with a steady attendance that averages between 10-12 weekly.

We have covered a variety of books this year, focussing on two publications by author John Pritchard whose books have provided us with thought provoking questions and conversation, and plenty of personal discovery into our life in faith.

Each week we use the Pray as you Go App to close our session in contemplative prayer and this year the app provided us with our Lent course, The Jerusalem Journey, used weekly throughout the season.

During the summer weeks we took advantage of the light evenings to take up a number of Prayer Walks, visiting the local community and praying specifically at our local hospitals and schools. This was a new activity for our group and we were all surprised at how much we actually got out of it on a spiritual level. We definitely plan to do this again.

Another new activity introduced to the group was an art session where we took inspiration from the works of Ben and Hannah Dunnett. We played inspirational music and painted and drew our own personal versions of our favourite pieces of theirs, another great session enjoyed by all.

A very important thing to know about BBC is that they take the needs of others into serious consideration and where a need is identified, always jump into action. This year we mounted a Christmas appeal throughout the group and the main body of the church, to collect items of personal hygiene in order to make Christmas gift sets for the children and young men at Clifford Holroyde School. This resulted in each and every one of them receiving one gift each. A very successful appeal indeed.

Children's and Family Ministry

Tots Church, for families with children under five has consistently on a weekly basis throughout the year, provided a firm foundation for family worship within all services at St. John's. The year has seen new ideas being generated and tried, including family church services taking place at 9am on Sundays before the main Sunday service at 10:30. Although these services were a huge amount of fun and learning and successful in their style, the services proved to be quite difficult to attend for some busy families. Another issue they raised was that families were beginning to miss attending services of Holy Communion and were also missed greatly by the general population of the congregation meaning the intergenerational community we had worked so hard to build was no longer there.

Following the departure of Rev. Tom Langdon Smith in September we saw the return of our families to our main services and children and their families were integrated back into our services and into the Tots Church area until plans for the future could be made.

Families and children have been in attendance throughout the year at events such as the 'Feast of Fun', PnP 'Summer Sessions',' Stir up Sunday', family film sessions, all age nativity, carols by candlelight and Christingle.

This year has been one of positive relationships between all our family and children's groups, improving attendance at Sunday worship and a marked increase in Baptism.

A very busy and successful year of growth in faith for all of our children and families.

Coffee, Craft and Chat.

Praise n Play

Praise n Play came into the new year of 2023 with a very strong group of two, three and four year olds, averaging between eight and twelve attending weekly. We did have the occasional visitor or one week attendee who gave us a try but decided we weren't for them, but we are never discouraged by this, in fact we embrace all newcomers, both those who stay and those who decide our group is not for them. This group was well established in their friendships and dynamics and had become accustomed to the faith framework of the session. Listening and re-telling stories from the Bible and following the lectionary, singing with confidence and joy, joining activities to support their age appropriate and individual stages of development, and praying creatively with a purpose. The healthy organic snack provides an opportunity for those with allergies, intolerances and at times a 'fear' of trying or the dislike of textures to be cared for, considered and encouraged. Whilst also providing opportunity to enhance important developmental skills in using tools while cutting and social skills in turn taking, and celebrations such as birthdays and the birth of babies. Another extremely important aspect of the group is the friendship and support of the adults both within the group and whilst networking with each other, offering practical and emotional support to each other whilst also learning alongside their children of a life with faith. As we approached the end of the school year in July a request was made by the parents and carers within the group that the sessions continue throughout the summer holidays in order to continue and maintain relationships with each other and their children, including older siblings. After a great deal of thought, prayer, and discussion with all church family's, a six-week plan of Summer Sessions was devised. This was very well attended and enjoyed by both PnP and church families who now became one group. Each session consisted of one hour of play followed by lunch and table talk, usually taking up to 1 hour, and by the second week, we were praying for many different reasons including prayers for each other. It was indeed a great success. Then came September, sadly we lost seven of our children in one go to nursery or school places, however we wished them well and prayed for them as they took the next steps of their journey in life. Just when we wondered what we would do to refresh and increase our group again we found very quickly we had a new influx of children, mothers and regular carers. This has steadily built and has actively encouraged new regular attendance to Tots

Church on a Sunday and increased the regular attendance of family and cafe church services. A great number of existing and new family members supported and attended Christmas events and services and we were very fortunate due to a generous grant from Scripture Union to provide each family with a gift of a Bible, each unique to their age and family personality.
